WELCOME TO WORSHIP AT UNIVERSITY LUTHERAN CHURCH on this Reformation Sunday. Today as we celebrate the 500th anniversary of the Reformation, we incorporate into our service several hymns by Martin Luther—ones that he composed and others for which he wrote the lyrics. We celebrate the unity that we have in Christ with all of our sisters and brothers throughout the world—a unity that transcends our divisions of the past and opens the door to a peace with people of all religions in the world.

WE WELCOME EVERYONE TO THE LORD'S TABLE to receive God's gift of forgiveness and the powerful freedom of a new life in Christ. Please come down the center aisle, proceed to the communion rail, and kneel or stand at the first open space. Hold out your hand to receive the bread. **Gluten-free wafers are available.** Please indicate your desire for a wafer at the time you are offered the bread. You may drink either from an individual glass, which will be served first, or from the chalice. The individual glasses in the center of the tray contain grape juice (golden color). The outside glasses contain red wine. An acolyte will pass by to pick up your individual glass. In the spirit of continuous communion, please return to your seat via the side aisles after you have drunk from the glass or chalice. After everyone has been served at the communion rail, the ministers will serve anyone in the pew that is unable to come forward. Please indicate your desire in this regard to the pastor. Parents who desire that their children not receive communion may bring them forward for a blessing.

PLEASE INDICATE YOUR ATTENDANCE at worship today and your participation at Holy Communion by completing the enclosed Worship Registration form and placing it in the offering plate. Please join us for fellowship and refreshments in the lounge after the service.

THERE ARE CHILDREN'S BAG with bulletins and books available in the lounge and the narthex. They are hanging on the wall.

CHILD CARE is available in the Nursery for children of any age. Ask the usher for directions.

First Lesson

Jeremiah 31:31-34

Second Lesson

Romans 3:19-28

Now we know that whatever the law says, it speaks to those who are under the law, so that every mouth may be silenced, and the whole world may be held accountable to God. For "no human being will be justified in his sight" by deeds prescribed by the law, for through the law comes the knowledge of sin. But now, apart from law, the righteousness of God has been disclosed, and is attested by the law and the prophets, the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction, since all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God; they are now justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, whom God put forward as a sacrifice of atonement by his blood, effective through faith. He did this to show his righteousness, because in his divine forbearance he had passed over the sins previously committed; it was to prove at the present time that he himself is righteous and that he justifies the one who has faith in Jesus. Then what becomes of boasting? It is excluded. By what law? By that of works? No, but by the law of faith. For we hold that a person is justified by faith apart from works prescribed by the law.


C: Amen. Come, Lord Jesus.

ONE FAITH, ONE BAPTISM, a *Solemn Vespers service on the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation* will be held at St. James Cathedral (9th and Marion) at **3:00 p.m. TODAY**. This observance is an opportunity for Christians of many denominations to pray for each other; to heal old wounds; and to continue along the path of encounter and dialogue. During this commemoration Archbishop J. Peter Sartain, Archbishop of the Catholic Archdiocese of Seattle, will be joined by our Bishop Kirby Unti, Bishop of the NW WA Synod of the ELCA.

THE SPECIAL OFFERING FOR OCTOBER IS SHARE/WHEEL. As many of you know we host a WHEEL shelter in our fellowship hall every night. What you may not know is that WHEEL does much more than help provide shelter to homeless women. WHEEL stands for Women's Housing, Equality and Enhancement League and is a non-profit, non-hierarchical group of homeless and formerly homeless women working on ending homelessness for women. Since 1993 WHEEL has initiated many campaigns that have improved the lives of all women. If you would like to contribute to SHARE/WHEEL you may do so by using a special offering envelope in the pew, making your check out the ULC, earmarking it for SHARE/WHEEL, and putting your gift in the offering plate, or bringing it to the church office. Thank you for your generous offering.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 1, THE TOWN HALL EVENT will be Brooke Gladstone, of NPR's "All Things Considered", presenting "Distorted Reality and Why We Believe It." In her new book *The Trouble With Reality: A Ruminantion on Moral panic In Our Time* Gladstone analyzes the methods deployed in the media to twist our perceptions by preying on stereotypes and subjectivity. She takes Town Hall's stage to reveal deceptive patterns she observes in the press and (she argues) in organizations such as the Trump administration. She deconstructs these techniques, citing writers such as Hannah Arendt, Philip K. Dick, and Jonathan Swift to bring us an informed look at reality-distorting strategies straight out of the authoritarian

playbook. With bracing candor, Gladstone outlines how we can reaffirm our belief in reality and offers hope for meaningful action, a time-tested treatment for moral panic, and the inevitable reckoning. **Doors open at 6:30 p.m., and the event starts at 7:30 p.m.** Tickets are \$5.
