

WELCOME TO WORSHIP AT UNIVERSITY LUTHERAN CHURCH on this Transfiguration Sunday when we long for the transformation in our lives that will lead us to be more faithful to the call of Jesus and more obedient to God's commandments. We participate in a Mountain Liturgy, adapted from the Seasons of Creation, that reminds us of our place and responsibility in this universe as creatures of God and caretakers of this planet Earth.

WE WELCOME EVERYONE TO THE LORD'S TABLE to receive God's gift of forgiveness and the powerful freedom of a new life in Christ. Please come down the center aisle, proceed to the communion rail, and kneel or stand at the first open space. Hold out your hand to receive the bread. **Gluten-free wafers are available.** Please indicate your desire at the time you are offered the bread. You may drink either from an individual glass, which will be served first, or from the chalice. The individual glasses in the center of the tray contain grape juice (golden color). The outside glasses contain red wine. An acolyte will pass by to pick up your individual glass. In the spirit of continuous communion, please return to your seat via the side aisles after you have drunk from the glass or chalice. After everyone has been served at the communion rail, the ministers will serve anyone in the pew that is unable to come forward. Please indicate your desire in this regard to the pastor. Parents who desire that their children not receive communion may bring them forward for a blessing.

PLEASE INDICATE YOUR ATTENDANCE at worship today and your participation in Holy Communion by completing the enclosed Worship Registration form and placing it in the offering plate. Please join us for fellowship and refreshments in the lounge after the service.

Service of Confession & Absolution

Confession

P: Creator God, you made the heavens and the Earth, including the grandeur of the mountains. We look around us and we see Mount Rainier, Mount Baker, Mount Olympus, and, on a clear day, all of the other mountains of the Cascades and Olympics. However, we also know that the mountains are a place to which we can escape from the cares and responsibilities of this world. Mindful of our role in contributing to whatever is wrong in this world, we confess our sins and seek your forgiveness.

(Silent Confession)

P: Gracious and merciful God,

All: We confess to you that when we stand on top of a mountain and look around at the world below, we see such a mixture of beauty and desolation and hear both the shouts of joy as well as the cries of despair. Even the Earth cries out in travail over the way that we human beings treat the natural world. None of us can escape the responsibility for this violation of God's creation, but we can repent and make the necessary changes in our lives for the good of all the Earth. As the first step in this repentance, we confess our part in whatever injustice, enmity, corruption, and violence infects our society and endangers our planet. Secondly, we bring our contrite hearts and minds to you and ask for your forgiveness. Thirdly, we turn back to you and commit our lives to your service.

Absolution

P: God in Christ hears our confession, forgives our sins, and calls us to return to the care of the Earth that honors the mountains, the seas, and all living creatures.

C: As we descend the mountain and return to daily life, we return as God's beloved children, holy, blameless and acceptable in God's sight. Glory to God in the highest and peace to all of God's creatures on Earth! Amen.

Help us to see in the surrounding landscape the places where we could improve our care of this Earth. Remind us that the hills and mountains are alive with your Spirit, and that all of the planetary creatures are our kin. We pray in the name of Jesus, who reconciles and renews all things in creation. Amen.

First Lesson

2 Kings 2:1-12

Today’s reading centers on the transfer of power and authority from the prophet Elijah to Elisha. Their travels, which retrace the path of Joshua back to Moab (the place where Moses died) and the parting of the waters, demonstrate that Elisha and Elijah are legitimate successors of the great prophet Moses.

Now when the Lord was about to take Elijah up to heaven by a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. Elijah said to Elisha, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me as far as Bethel." But Elisha said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they went down to Bethel. The company of prophets who were in Bethel came out to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?" And he said, "Yes, I know; keep silent." Elijah said to him, "Elisha, stay here; for the Lord has sent me to Jericho." But he said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they came to Jericho. The company of prophets who were at Jericho drew near to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?" And he answered, "Yes, I know; be silent." Then Elijah said to him, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me to the Jordan." But he said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So the two of them went on. Fifty men of the company of prophets also went, and stood at some distance from them, as they both were standing by the Jordan. Then Elijah took his mantle and rolled it up, and struck the water; the water was parted to the one side and to the other, until the two of them crossed on dry ground. When they had crossed, Elijah said to Elisha, "Tell me what I may do for you, before I am taken from you." Elisha said, "Please let me inherit a double share of your spirit." He responded, "You have asked a hard thing; yet, if you see me as I am being taken from you, it will be granted you; if not, it will not." As they continued walking and talking, a chariot of fire and horses of fire separated the two of them, and Elijah ascended in a whirlwind into heaven. Elisha kept watching and crying out, "Father, father! The chariots of Israel and its horsemen!" But when he could no longer see him, he grasped his own clothes and tore them in two pieces.



Gospel

Mark 9:2-9

Mark's gospel presents the transfiguration as a preview of what would become apparent to Jesus' followers after he rose from the dead. Confused disciples are given a vision of God's glory manifest in the beloved Son.

Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and led them up a high mountain apart, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. And there appeared to them Elijah with Moses, who were talking with Jesus. Then Peter said to Jesus, "Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." He did not know what to say, for they were terrified. Then a cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud there came a voice, "This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!" Suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them anymore, but only Jesus. As they were coming down the mountain, he ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead.

Eucharistic Prayer

P: From Mount Zion, we hear the voice of God inviting us to come and listen to all that Jesus has to say, and observe all that Jesus has done. What we hear are words like: Come unto me all you who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Let not your hearts be troubled. Your sins are forgiven. I was sent for the purpose of proclaiming the good news of God's realm. Do not be anxious about what you are to eat or wear. I am the Bread of Life. Love one another, as I have loved you. Peace, I leave with you; my peace I give to you.

We also see Jesus performing deeds like: feeding people who are hungry; healing the sick; casting out demons; violating religious laws; challenging religious leaders; advocating for those who are poor; living simply; dining with tax collectors and outcasts; dying on a cross; and breathing his Spirit on those who decided to follow him.

In this same way, Jesus took bread, gave thanks, broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take and eat. This is my body given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Likewise, Jesus took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Remembering Jesus' transfiguration on the mountain, his death on Mount Calvary, his rising from the dead, and his ascension into the heavens, we come to this holy table with all of the anticipation of a people hoping for a transformation in our own lives.

When we come to this table, we know that it is good for us to be here, but that we also are not here to stay, because Jesus calls us to follow him into the world to proclaim and demonstrate the good news of God's love, justice, and peace as revealed in Jesus Christ through whom all glory and honor are yours, both now and forever.
